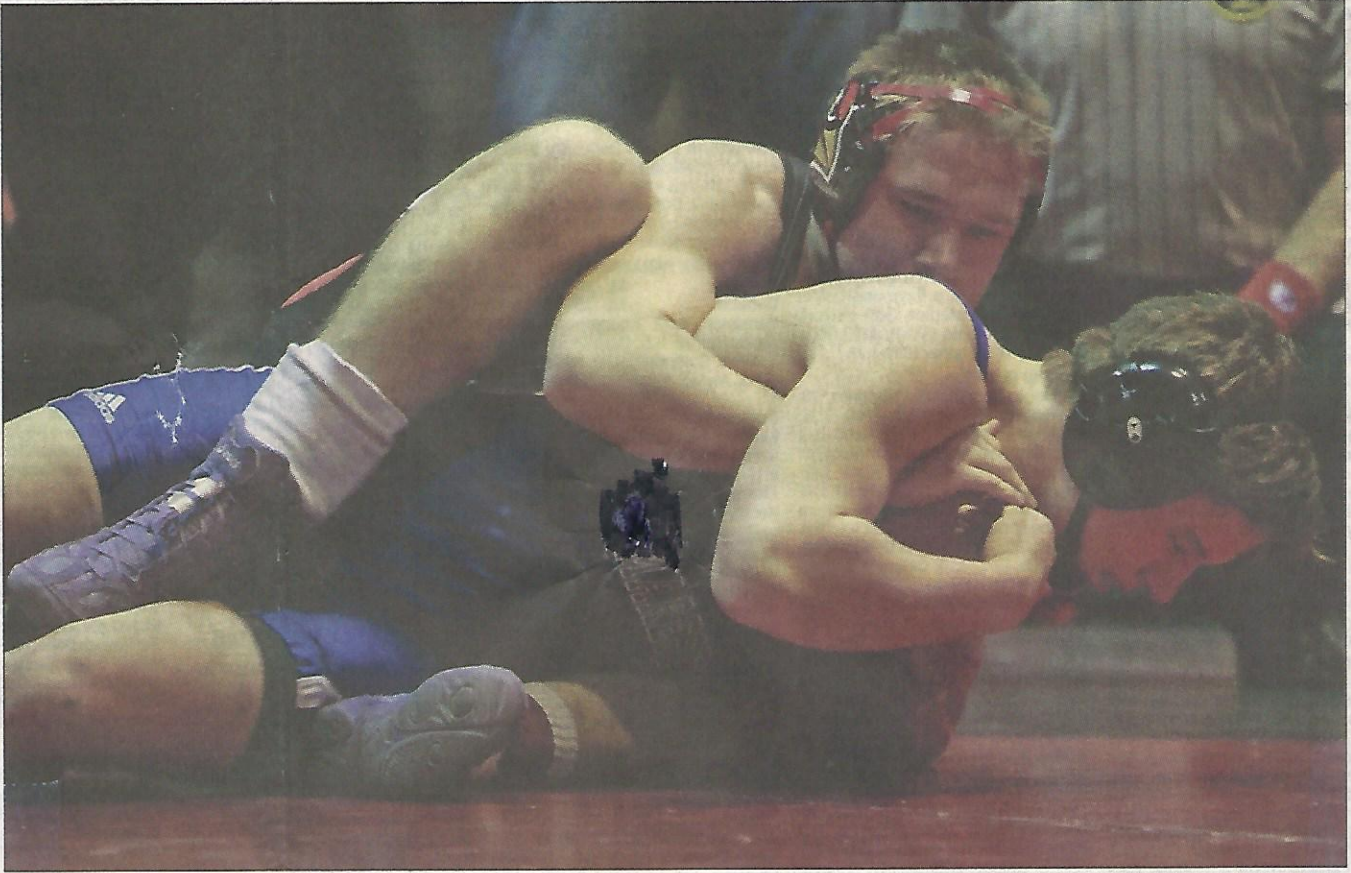

Fight to the finish

Dumont's Tolotti prevails on third OT criteria

SUFFERN, N.Y. — Ian Tolotti never met a challenge he didn't like.

So it was no surprise when he found himself into the third overtime against Bergen Catholic's Evan Quinn on Monday in the quarterfinals of the BCCA George Jockish Holiday Wrestling Tournament.

The Dumont junior rode Quinn for 30 seconds to win the eventual tiebreaker at 113 pounds and advance to today's semifinals in the most packed weight class of the event.

"I was a little nervous going into it because I hadn't been in a ride-out in a while," said Tolotti, a returning Bergen runner-up and one of eight returning place-winners at 113. "I just did everything I could to keep him down. It wasn't easy."

Tolotti and Quinn were meeting for the fourth time and, as usual, were locked in a

tight duel. They were tied at 7 after regulation and it remained that way through the first two overtimes.

"In overtime, I just knew I had to keep my composure," said the fourth-seeded Tolotti, who will face top-seeded Paco Robles of Emerson/Park Ridge in the semifinals. "He got out on me three times in regulation. I just did everything I could do to keep him down."

Two-time returning champion Bergen Catholic pulled in front after the quarterfinals and two rounds of consolations over second-place St. Joseph, 137½-95. Don Bosco is third with 92½, and Paramus fourth with 87.

The Crusaders lead all teams with 10 wrestlers in the semifinals, while St. Joseph has six and Don Bosco five.

Twenty-five teams will be represented in the semifinals beginning 12:30 p.m. at the Rockland Community College Fieldhouse.

Senior Brandon Gallagher is still feeling the jubilation of Westwood's second straight

state football championship. But he showed no ill effects from the quick turnaround to wrestling, scoring a 16-1 technical fall over Demarest's Sam Duffany to advance to the 195 semis.

"It was a real change of pace going from football practice to wrestling," said Gallagher, the second seed who had three days rest in between seasons. "But I love wrestling."

Gallagher, who will face Hackensack's Elijah Covington, and fellow football players Steve Baez and Karl Seitz are looking to bring that winning mentality to the wrestling team this year.

"We want to take on as much leadership as we can," he said of his fellow seniors. "Work hard and do the right thing and it will make you successful."

Lodi's Dom Salvatore, a returning seventh at 126, took to his role as the top seed with a 7-0 victory over Trevor Haberli of Pascack

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Hills in the quarters.

"This is the hardest county tournament in the state," he said. "If you wrestle well in this, you're going to wrestle well the rest of the year."

Bergen Catholic's Dave Bren-

nan, who did a spectacular job for the Crusaders last year while filling in for several injured teammates, made his presence felt with a 6-2 victory over top-seeded Roy Forsys of Becton/Wallington at 160.

Don Bosco's Jeff Lombardi pinned Joe DeVito of Paramus in 5:40 to advance in a tough 182-

pound bracket. Third-seeded Lombardi, who won at 195 last year, only to be ruled ineligible because of a technicality with his weight certification, will face second-seeded Vin Mainiero in one semifinal, while top-seeded Kevin Mulligan of Bergen Catholic will face Ridgewood's Kyle Inlander in the other.

Top-notch teams face balancing act

SUFFERN, N.Y. — To ease the burden on wrestlers and attract a few more fans, the BCCA George Jockish Holiday tournament ended with four matches going on at the same time in each weight class. The bouts for first, third, fifth and seventh place all were held simultaneously.

With nine finalists and three champions, the Crusaders won their 18th title in the last 25 years, and though Crusaders coach Dave Bell said it never gets old, there could come a day when Bell's team decides two days at Rockland Community College isn't worth it.

Last year, the tournament organizers were able to tweak the schedule to allow the Crusaders to compete in the now 55-year-old county tournament which bills itself as one of the largest wrestling tournaments in the nation, and then go out to The Clash in Minnesota.

Bell said his team was invited back

to The Clash this year, but decided home, well, Rockland County, was the place to be.

"We thought about it," said Bell. "We thought long and hard. If something were to change in terms of how they ran the tournament, we would reconsider it, but [Tournament co-director] Jack McCarty is a longtime friend and as much as there may be some animosity coming our way, but at the same time, it's Bergen County, and my feeling this year is, if we were to leave, it would have been disrespectful to everyone. It would have been that attitude that 'We're better, we're too good for you guys.'"

Bell should be lauded for his work to turn the Crusaders into a nationally prominent program. He is thoughtful and for a wrestling coach, incredibly soft-spoken.

He gets his kids prepared and makes them better, the epitome of what a coach should do.

But one very easily can make the argument that his team is too good and has zapped some of the drama from the event. Bergen Catholic won the team title by more than 100 points over St. Joseph.

In the 14 weight classes, the Crusaders had three champs, six second-

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place winners, a third, a fourth and a seventh, for 12 medalists total.

Take it a step further, 10 of the 14 winners were from non-public schools, and 18 of the 28 finalists. 23 of the last 25 team champions are non-public schools.

But in wrestling, competitive balance is systemic. Though there may be some wrestling coaches who would like to see all the non-public schools out of the tournament, or in their own separate event, it kind of contradicts what the sport is all about.

"I come from the school of thought that you want to compete against the best kids, so personally, I think taking the best kids out

of the tournament would be a bad thing," said Ridgewood coach Torre Watson. "It's tough though."

Don Bosco coach Chris Bitetto said that whether or not his team, which finished third, comes back to the tournament next year is "up in the air." A big reason why the Ironmen participated this year was to get senior Zach Chakonis a shot at being just the ninth four-time champion.

For Bergen Catholic, next year could be a showcase for Nick Suriano to win his fourth county title, and Bell said that would be a consideration in their decision.

"I know Nick's dad wrestled in this tournament, and it means a lot to Nick to come," said Bell.

"When we finally settled on coming here, he was very comfortable with that."

It's hard to imagine a county event without one of the big non-public schools, but with the explosion of other events across the country and national polls, it's a balancing act.

"It would be very different without them all being here," said Watson. "But most of us don't think of our opponents, we think about the kids we have in the room and we try to prepare them to be as successful as they can be."

Tournament co-director Ed Salvi said that if a school opts out of being in the county tournament one year, they would be welcomed

back.

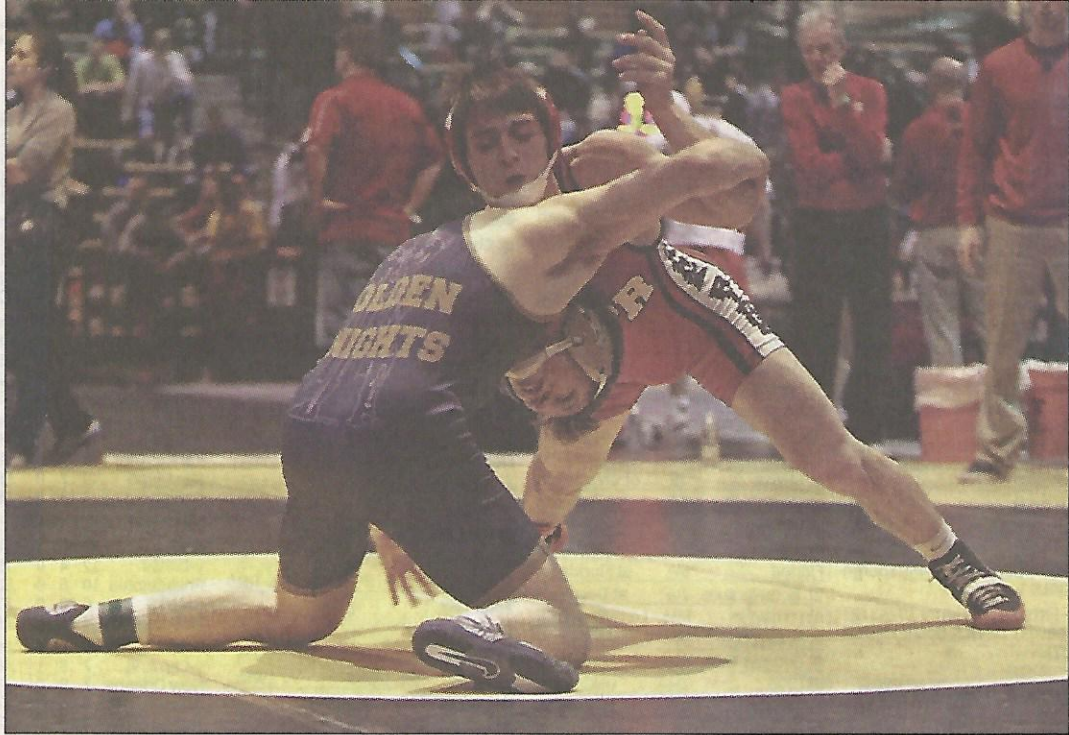
"As long as they are members of the BCCA, we wouldn't hold a team out," said Salvi.

The idea to have four mats for the final round was a smart one. It was nice to see some different colored singlets at the end and more fans seemed to stick around. Getting the common fan up to Rockland Community College still is not an easy sell.

The gym is cold and sterile with the bleachers far back from the action, so the event always seems to lack some juice.

The tournament still has the best teams in Bergen County, although the decision to stay is getting harder.

Hasbrouck Heights senior on gold quest

SUFFERN, N.Y. — Mauro Altamura is using his experience wrestling at Madison Square Garden to launch an attack at gold at the Bergen Holiday wrestling tournament.

He knows it won't be easy with a defending tournament finalist standing in his way. But Altamura is confident the lesson he learned under the bright lights of the Garden has put him in position for a special season.

The senior at Hasbrouck Heights cruised into the 220-pound semifinals at the BCCA George Jockish Holiday tournament with a pair of impressive first-period pins on Monday at Rockland Community College.

He is to face Bergen Catholic senior Connor O'Brien in the BCAA semifinals today, and isn't taking anything for granted after losing to defending New York state champion Nathanael Rose in the Grapple at the Garden on Dec. 21 just a day after earning his 100th win.

"I'm actually glad I took that loss because it woke me up," Altamura said.

"That opened my eyes and

taught me I can't get complacent. I was a little too high after getting that [100th] win, and that brought me back down to reality."

Altamura didn't waste time getting back on track at the BCCA tourney, pinning his two opponents in 2:18 total from the top seed at 220.

The defending district champion and region finalist expects to face a tougher challenge in the semis against O'Brien, who made the finals here last year and was within a few seconds of winning a title.

The two met in the Bergen County freshman tournament three years ago, with O'Brien coming out with the win — not that the loss motivates Altamura.

"I want to come out with the gold," Altamura said. "But I can't look ahead. I have to keep my head on right and stay focused and keep building."

Rutherford sophomore Omar Abdelhamid built on a strong start to make a surprising run to the semifinals at 152 pounds after older brother Mohamed made the semis at 145.

Omar pinned in his opening match, upset sixth-seed Dennis Martinez, 6-1, in the prequarterfinals and then knocked off third-seeded Jeff Rivera, 10-5, in the quarters.

That sets up a showdown against second-seeded Shane Sosinsky of Northern Highlands in the semis.

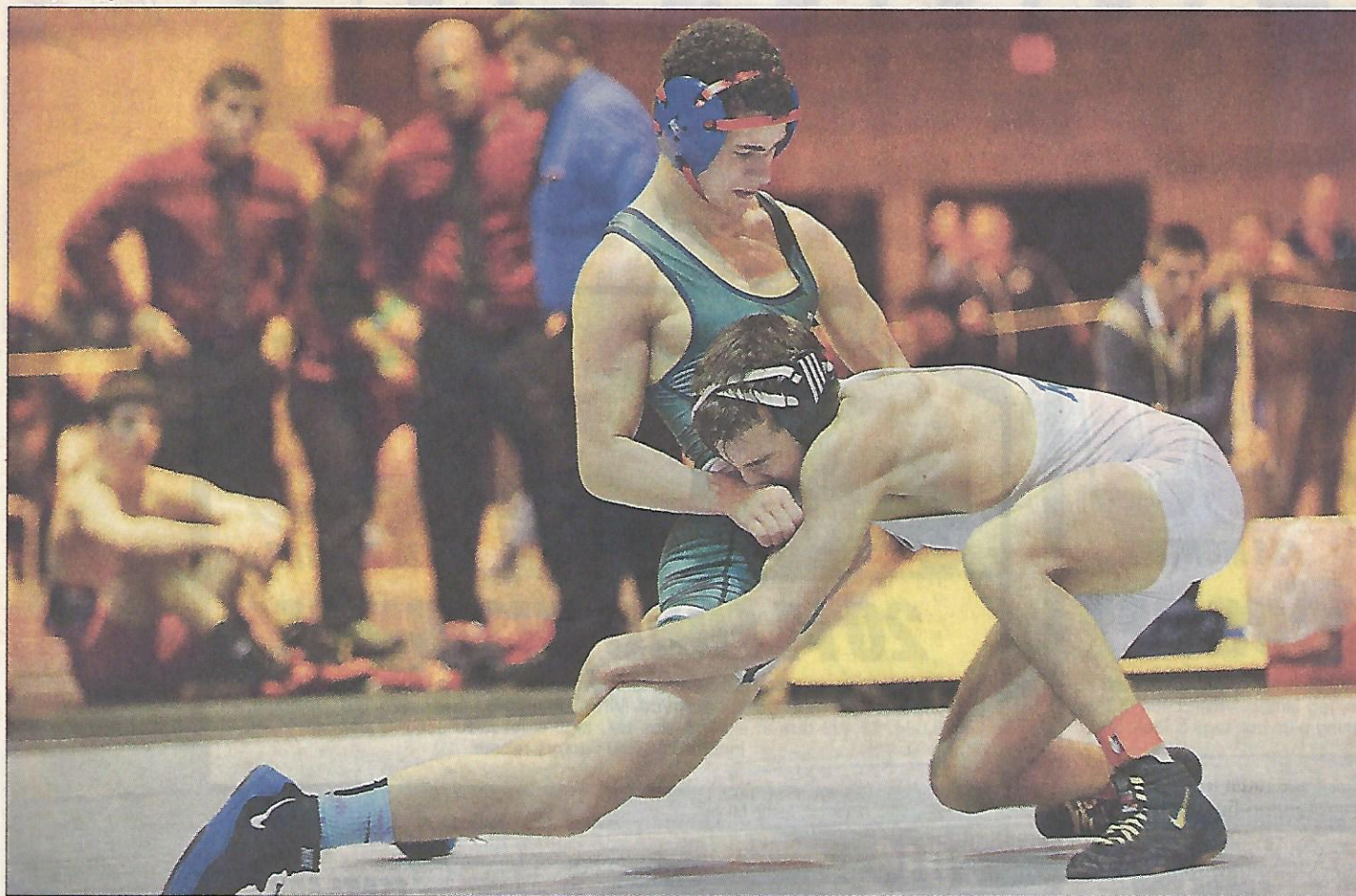
"Most people don't expect us to win this," Omar said of him and his brother. "But we believe that anything can happen in wrestling and anyone can beat anyone in any given match."

Mohamed's run was a little more predictable. He is the second overall seed at 145 and pinned in his first two matches before earning a 9-6 decision over Owen Ross in the quarters.

That win was more than enough motivation for Omar to pull his second upset.

"Me and my brother are really competitive and we always fight at home," Omar said. "When he made it to the semifinals it made me want to make it even more."

Gil pushes Ramapo ahead

Junior scores impressive upset at 126 pounds

SUFFERN, N.Y. — Wilfredo Gil pulled the upset, got the gold medal and put Ramapo back on the North Jersey wrestling map with a clutch performance on Bergen County's biggest stage.

And yet even after all that, both he and his coach said this is just the beginning of bigger things to come for him and the program.

Gil, a junior, upset top-seeded Dom Salvatore of Lodi, 2-1, in overtime of their 126-pound final at the BCCA George Jockish Holiday wrestling tournament Tuesday night at Rockland Community College.

He is the Green Raiders' first

Holiday tournament champion in a decade and hopes to be the guy who returns the program to its past glory.

"I want to be that person, I want to be the captain and lead the team to victories," Gil said. "Over the last couple of years, we have not been a very good wrestling program. But we've grown as a program and I think we can compete with better teams now."

Gil, the third seed at 126, proved Ramapo can still build champions with his strong performance in the finals. He was the aggressor throughout, pulled in a couple of nice singles in regulation, but never could get behind Salvatore for the takedown.

The two exchanged escapes

in regulation and neither scored in the first overtime. Gil rode Salvatore out in the second OT and then broke free for the winning escape 15 seconds into the third overtime period.

He's Ramapo's first BCCA champion since Jim Schulz in 2004.

"For me it's a big moral boost to see what I can achieve in the future," Gil said. "I'm usually not a strong wrestler on top. But I was able to hold him down, which was pretty nerve-racking."

Ramapo has struggled to fill its lineup the last couple of years and didn't win a match four years ago.

But it's steadily improved its numbers and results since, winning five matches last year and

becoming more competitive with the better teams it faces.

"We have 20 kids in the room working hard every day," Ramapo coach Brian Gibbs said. "They know the program was up five years ago and they want to get it back to there."

Gil is leading that turnaround with his work ethic and dedication. Ramapo expects to have a full lineup this year ("As long as everyone stays healthy," Gibbs said) with Gil anchoring it.

"It's only going to be up from here," Gibbs said. "He [Gil] is the face of the wrestling program and he has another year left, which is great. There isn't a harder worker around here than him and it's good to have him setting the pace."

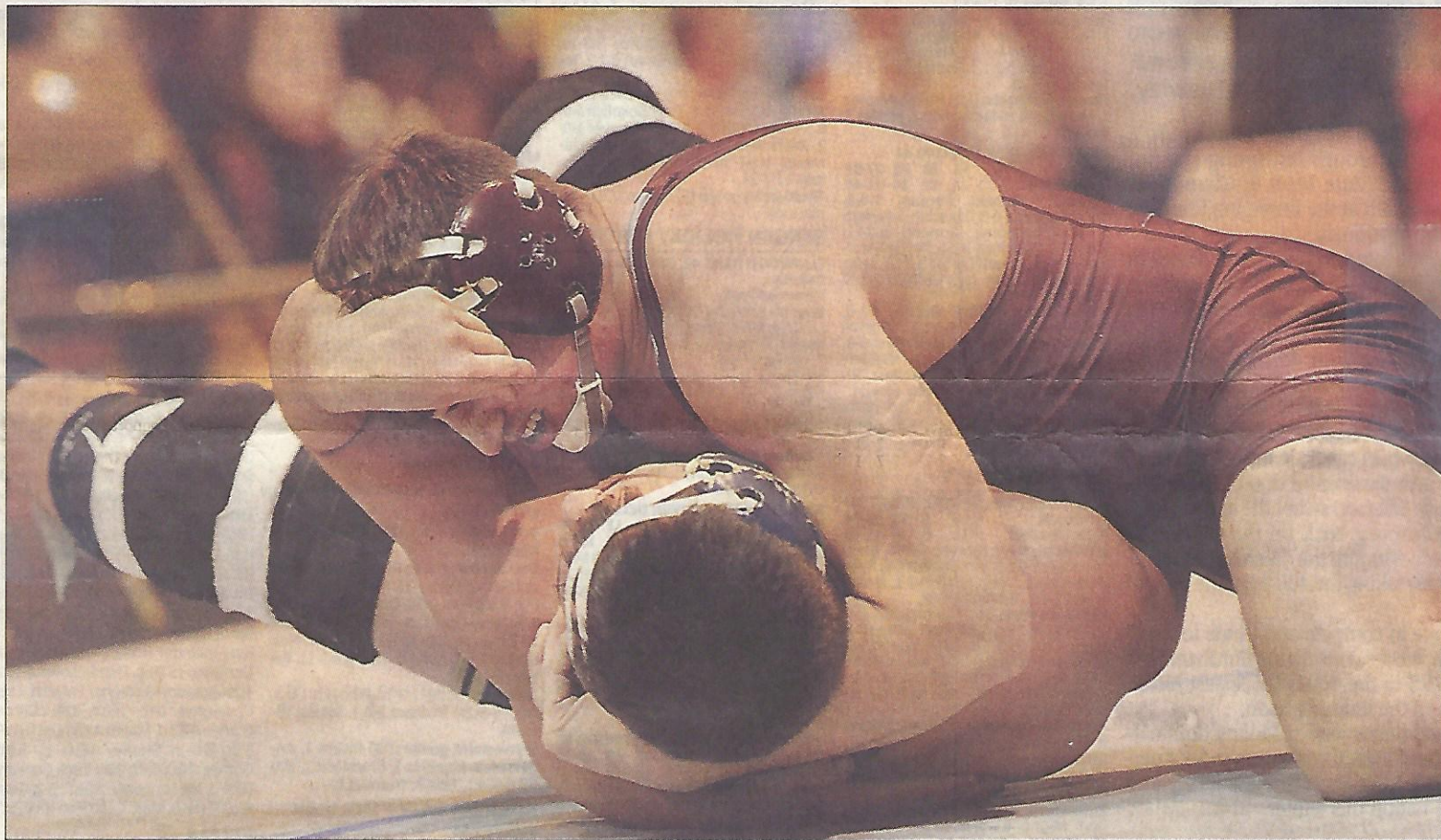

Chakonis is ninth to claim county sweep

SUFFERN, N.Y. — When Don Bosco coach Chris Bitetto and heavy-weight Zack Chakonis score a point off each other in practice, it's a moment to be savored.

"There's a certain amount of jockeying going on," Bitetto said. "He'll try to distract you and take you down, then make a big show of it to everybody."

Chakonis put on another show at Rockland Community College, posting three first-period pins and a decision to win his fourth BCCA George Jockish Holiday title and join his coach as one of just nine wrestlers to

accomplish the feat in the 55-year history of the tournament.

"It's a great accomplishment when you look at the list of guys who have done it," said Chakonis, who pinned Hackensack's Goran Krasic in 1:01 in the final. "I set high goals for myself and it's something I've worked for."

"We never really talked about the four championships," said Bitetto, who took the Ironmen to the Holiday tournament this year instead of another event, in part because of Chakonis' drive for four. "He's got one goal and that's to win a state championship."

While one Ironman won his fourth, another finally tasted the top of the podium, as Kyle Bierdumpfel

made a second-period escape stand up for the second straight week to edge Bergen Catholic's Laurien Anghelina, 1-0, at 138.

"I thought I had a takedown at the edge [in the third period], but they didn't call it," said Bierdumpfel, a junior who beat Anghelina by the same score last week in the Beast of the East tournament. "In the county final, you're not going to hold anything back. It's good to finally win one."

Bergen Catholic rolled to its third straight team title and a record 18th overall ahead of second-place St. Joseph, 280½-178½. Bosco, which had four champions to three apiece for BC and St. Joseph, was third with

167½. Paramus was the top public-school finisher with 154 points for fourth.

Junior Nick Suriano of Bergen Catholic powered to his third straight title, posting three pins and a 3-0 final victory over returning champ Anthony Rubinetti of Demarest to win the 120-pound title. Joe Trovato of Paramus also won his third title, making a third-period escape stand up against Shane Sosinsky of Northern Highlands at 152.

Fourth-seeded Michael Carfagno of St. Joseph streaked to his first title at 195, pinning top-seeded Danny DeLorenzi of Bergen Catholic in the semis and downing second-seeded

Brandon Gallagher of Westwood, 10-5, in the final. Teammate Jonathan Tropea won his first showdown with Bergen Catholic freshman Carmen Ferrante, 3-2, to win his second title at 106.

Chakonis, a two-time state runner-up, is hoping this is a preview

of what's to come in a season of high expectations.

He's the top-ranked 285-pounder in the nation in one poll and committed to wrestle at Northwestern in the Big Ten. But at 220 pounds Tuesday, he was well outweighed by most of his opponents.

"If you look at a lot of the D-I heavyweights, they're transforming into lighter, quicker wrestlers," he said. "That's what I was recruited as, so that's what I'm trying to work on."

Returning runner-up Tyler Mullen of Old Tappan knocked off unseeded Dave Brennan of Bergen

Catholic, 9-8, in the most entertaining bout of the night to win his first title at 160 pounds. Brennan nearly erased a four-point deficit late in the third, scoring a takedown with 11 seconds remaining to pull within one. But he couldn't turn Mullen for the winning back points.

After a grueling workout with Olympic-caliber wrestlers this past summer, Nick Suriano ran nearly a mile back to his room in the Arizona heat with a duffle bag stuffed with his gear draped across his shoulders.

In October, he defended his No. 1 national ranking by winning a bout/battle of wills that went on for 33 minutes.

He has two state titles and zero losses in his high school career. So when the junior steps inside the Bergen Catholic wrestling room, it's no surprise many of his teammates look to him as an inspiration and a mentor.

"They watch me and try to learn from me and I help them," said Suriano, The Record Male Athlete of the Week. "Kids will come up to me and ask me, 'Hey, what do you do when this happens?' Or, 'Can you help me with this?' Or I'll watch them and they'll do something I think I can help them improve upon.

"It's not that I'm a master of the sport. I'm just trying to help out, trying to give a helping hand."

The rest of the Crusaders probably were watching closely as Suriano rolled to his third Beast of the East title Dec. 21. He beat Jake Newhouse of Perry High School in Massillon, Ohio, 8-1, in the 120-pound final.

In the tournament – which always is stocked with some of the best wrestlers in the country – Suriano registered three pins. The six points he gave up came on escapes. His win in the second-to-last title bout helped Bergen Catholic push ahead of Phillipsburg and finish fourth overall in the team standings – and first among New Jersey teams other than perennial powerhouse Blair Academy.

Suriano, who beat Sean Conoly by technical fall, 17-1 (3:50), in a dual meet against Hanover Park on Saturday, says his drive to succeed permeates all areas of his life, whether he's on the mat or playing FIFA World Cup on PlayStation with friends.

He's confident his ability to work just a little harder than the next guy will make him a successful businessman someday. He's considering studying business at whichever school he attends, and he always can get some pointers from his dad, Robert, who runs his own pest control business.

"It's all about dedicating and sacrificing," Suriano said. "... Other people are partying and going out, and I'm training."

Also nominated: Tyler Pepe of Passaic Valley and Jonathan Tropea of St. Joseph for wrestling.
